Sean Fleming Named to NABC All-America Second Team

Senior captain Sean Fleming completed his four-year career at Clark in fine fashion and received a number of postseason honors. He was named to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) All-America Second Team placing him among the top 16 Division III college



basketball players in the country. The NEWMAC Player of the Year for the second consecutive year led the team with 18.6 points per game. He added 5.2 rebounds per game and 2.9 assists per game. Fleming was ranked second nationally in free-throw percentage (91.2). He earned all-conference honors for the third consecutive season and was among conference leaders in eight statistical categories including first in scoring, three-point field goal percentage and free-throw percentage. Selected to the ECAC New England All-Star First Team, the D3hoops.com All-America Fourth Team, the D3hoops.com All-Northeast Regional First Team, Fleming also played in the NEBCA All-Star game as a member of the south team and he received the NEBCA Bob Cousy award, which is awarded annually to the most outstanding Division I, II or III New England men's basketball player under six feet. ★

Athletic Department Award Winners Announced

The athletic department award winners and senior athletes were honored at the annual Clark University Athletic Awards Program on Monday, April 28th. A scholar athlete reception was held before the awards program honoring 99 athletes who had earned a 3.5 GPA for the 2002 spring semester and/or 2002 fall semester and/or have a 3.5 cumulative GPA.

The Russ Granger Award for academic excellence and athletic achievement by a male athlete was awarded to **Nathan Lavery '03**, a four-year player and captain his senior year on the soccer team. The economics/government major maintained a 3.7 grade point average and is a two-time member of the NEWMAC Academic All-Conference team and received Clark scholar-athlete honors all four years.

Rachael Turkington '03 was awarded the Alice Higgins Award, for academic excellence and athletic achievement by

a female athlete. Turkington, a three-year starter on the women's basketball team and a senior captain was named to the Verizon Academic All-America District I First Team this year and the second team in 2002. In addition, she was named to the NEWBA All-New England Third Team, the ECAC New England Honorable Mention Team and the NEWMAC All-Conference First Team in 2003. She has received NEWMAC Academic All-Conference honors and Clark Scholar-Athlete honors three times as a psychology major and has achieved a 3.8 grade-point average.

Sean Fleming '03 received the Fred Hebert Trophy, which is awarded to the outstanding senior male athlete who has made a significant contribution to the intercollegiate athletic program and whose dedication and performance have enriched the tradition of Clark athletics. Fleming, a four-year member of the basketball team and two-year

Men's Basketball Makes Third Consecutive Appearance in NCAA Tournament

The men's basketball team made its third consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament and its fourth in the last five years. The team won more than 20 games for the third consecutive season, finishing the 2002-03 campaign 21-7.

The Cougars, who returned four starters, seven seniors and 11 players overall and had made trips to the NCAA Elite Eight in 2001 and 2002, had high expectations set by Head Coach Paul Phillips. The Cougars started the season in the Elizabethtown Tournament and fell to the Blue Jays, 103-96. After a tough loss to regionally ranked Amherst College, 68-62, Clark won four straight and nine out of the next 10.

The Cougars earned the No. 1 seed in the NEWMAC Tournament for the third-straight season. In a thrilling championship game, the Cougars defeated Babson College 84-76 in overtime, their third win of the season over the regionally ranked Beavers. This was the Cougars' third consecutive conference championship and fourth in the five-year history of the league. Senior captain Sean Fleming led the Cougars with 35 points.

The Cougars faced Little East Conference champion Western Connecticut State University in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and fell in the last seconds of the game, 84-82. In a back-and-forth game where both teams shot over 45.0 percent, neither team led by more than six the entire second half. With Clark trailing by two, 78-77 with 3:13 to play, junior Dave McNamara hit a deep three to give the Cougars an 80-78 lead. Clark pushed the lead to four with 1:32 left on first-year Tim Dutille's layup but WCONN answered tying the score at 82-82 with 40 seconds to play. Fleming was forced to shoot a three with the shot clock winding down that looked good

but slid right with less than seven seconds to play. WCONN's Jay Reginatto pushed the ball the length of the court pulling up at the foul line extended and hit the game-winner with less than a second, to lead the Colonials to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. McNamara ended the game with a team-high 22 points including 6-for-10 from behind the arc while Fleming chipped in 16 points and seven rebounds. Dutille had a career-high 21 points on 10-for-13 shooting for Clark.

Fleming, the NEWMAC Player of the Year for the second consecutive year, was the team's scoring leader this year with 18.6 points a game. He was selected to the NABC All-America Second Team (see related story). McNamara and classmate Trevor Walker added to the potent offense. McNamara, who was named to the all-conference team for the third consecutive year, was second on the team in scoring (17.4). He hit 46.4 percent from long range and was ranked sixth nationally in three-point field goal percentage (46.7) and 17th in three-point field goals per

game (3.1). He was named to the D3hoops.com All-Northeast Regional Third Team. Walker was third on the team in scoring with 14 points per game, while shooting 40.6 percent from long range, and made the all-conference team for the second consecutive year. Walker was named to the ECAC All-Star Second Team and McNamara was named to the ECAC Honorable Mention Team.

Fleming finished his career fifth on Clark's all-time scoring list with 1,561 points. McNamara is tied for 10th with 1,379 points and Walker is 17th with 1,170. Senior Rob Skowyra had a solid year, with 74 points, 4.8 rebounds per game, 2.9 assists per game while averaging 1.3 steals per game.

Phillips was named NEWMAC Coach of the Year for the third time. He has directed the Cougars to an impressive 127-64 overall record in seven years at Clark.

"Our team had a very good year but fell short of our goal to advance to the Final Four," commented Phillips. "We reached a number of other goals which included another 20-win season, winning the regular season conference title and most importantly winning the NEWMAC Championship to return to the NCAA Tournament. Our success is attributed to the seven seniors who were the backbone of our team and had great careers. They certainly raised the bar for the future players of Clark University's men's basketball program," explained Phillips. ★

WINTER/SPRING SEASON WRAP-UP

Women's Basketball

The women's basketball team completed the season 12-13 overall and 4-5 in the NEWMAC under the direction of Pat Glispin (19th year). The Cougars, the number eight seed in the NEWMAC Championship, traveled to number one seed Babson College and attempted to defeat the Beavers for the second time this year, but fell short 74-48 in the first round. Clark started the season winning the Worcester City Tip-off Tournament for the seventh consecutive year led by senior captain Rachael Turkington who was named tournament MVP for the second year in a row. The Cougars won their first four games of the year including victories over Western Connecticut (71-48) and Connecticut College (65-62). During a winter break trip to California the Cougars defeated tournament host CSU-Monterey Bay, 85-72, and fell to a Division II NAAI school Graceland University 80-66.

Turkington who earned numerous post season honors (see related awards story) finished the season leading the



country in three-point field goals made per game (4.0). She led the team in scoring (17.9) while shooting 34.7 from the field and 36.9 from long range. She hit an impressive

99 three-pointers in 24 games. Turkington ranked in the top 10 in six NEWMAC statistical categories, leading the conference in scoring and three-point field goal percentage. Sophomore twins Echo and Briana Freeman were major contributors to the Cougars' offense. Echo was second on the team in scoring with 11.1 points per game. She led the team with 6.6 rebounds per game while shooting a solid 44.7 percent from the floor. Briana, who played in all 25 games, averaged 7.9 points a game and 4.3 rebounds per game.

Men's & Women's Swimming

The men's swim team finished the season 4-8 and placed seventh at the NEWMAC Championship. The Cougars

recorded wins over Gordon College (104-84), Wheaton College (133-90), UMass Dartmouth (119-83) and Colby-Sawyer College (75-58).

Junior Roy Barnum led the Cougars winning multiple events four times during the year. He set a school record in the 100 individual medley (56.28) at the NEWMAC Championships. A versatile competitor, he swam in 10 different events during the year and recorded top five all-time finishes in the 100-yard freestyle (48.91, 4th), 50-yard backstroke (27.44, 2nd) and 50-yard breaststroke (29.54, 4th).



The women's swim team finished the season 5-7 and placed eighth at the NEWMAC Championships. The Cougars started the season winning three out of their first four meets with wins over Gordon College (147-128), Bridgewater State College (122-120) and Babson College (134.5-103.5). Clark also defeated Colby-Sawyer 125-88 and cross-town rival WPI 133-103 later in the season. Senior captain Ildiko Polyak led the Cougars winning multiple events five times this year. She had a solid performance at the NEWMAC Championships recording her best times of the season in the 200 freestyle (2:05.33), 500 freestyle (5:32.79) and 1650 freestyle (19:41.06). Polyak finished her career with top five times in the 200 freestyle (2:03.45, 5th), 500 freestyle (5:29.92, 4th), 1000 freestyle (11:28.43, 5th) and 100 backstroke (1:06.66, 5th). In addition, she was on the 400-yard medley relay team that holds the school record (4:15.92).

Baseball

The baseball team completed the season with a 9-19 overall record under fourth-year head coach Jason Falcon. The Cougars placed fifth with a 4-8 record in the NEWMAC. Highlighting the year was the Cougars' 7-6 win in 11 innings over Wheaton College. Wheaton, who went on to win the NEWMAC Championship for the fifth time in the

five-year history of the league, was nationally ranked at the time of the Cougars' victory.

First-year pitcher Scott Archibald recorded the win. He pitched six innings of relief to close out the game. He allowed no earned runs while scattering six hits and striking out seven. Archibald, the Cougars' top pitcher, earned all-conference second team honors compiling a 4-1 record with one save in nine appearances. In 40.1 innings pitched, he allowed 42 hits and 11 earned runs while striking out 50 and walking only 11. His 2.47 ERA led the team and ranked fourth among conference leaders. "Our program made several big strides and there were more bright spots than in years past," said Falcon. "I am confident that with the returning players and the incoming freshmen we will continue to build and become a successful program in the years to come."



Softball

The softball team compiled a 14-15 overall record under the direction of head coach Linda Wage (15th season). The Cougars placed fifth in the NEWMAC with an 8-8 record. The Cougars ended the regular season with two-game sweeps over MIT and Mount Holyoke. In the quarterfinals of the NEWMAC Championship, the Cougars lost a heart breaking game 4-3 to Smith College.

Sophomore shortstop Jen Scavone had another outstanding year and led the Cougars in 2003. Scavone, who earned NEWMAC Rookie of the Year and first-



team all-America honors last year, led the team with a .466 batting average. Scavone, also led the team in hits (41), home runs (3) and runs (33), and was second in RBIs (23) and doubles (9). She led the conference in batting average and was named to the all-conference first team, her second

consecutive appearance on the all-conference team. In addition, she was named to the NFHCA New England Regional All-America First Team, NEISCA All-Star First Team and ECAC New England All-Star First Team for the second straight year. Senior first baseman



and tri-captain Laura Gagnon also had an impressive year for the Cougars. An all-conference first team selection for the first time, she was second on the team in batting average

(.432). Gagnon, who started in all 29 games, was second on the team in hits (38), first in RBIs (24), second in doubles (9) and second in home runs (2). Gagnon was named to the NFHCA New England Regional All-America Third Team and NEISCA All-Star Honorable Mention Team. Graduate student pitcher/infielder Holly Scavone was named to the all-conference second team, her fourth appearance on the all-conference team. She was third on the team in batting average (.354), hits (35) and doubles (7). She was tied for the team lead in triples with three and had 10 RBIs in 29 games. "We competed all year with a young squad and we are optimistic about the future," commented Wage.

Men's Tennis

Under the direction of third-year head coach David Zeutas-Broer, the men's tennis team concluded the spring season with a 4-7 overall record and posted a 1-5 record in the NEWMAC. The Cougars were ranked sixth in the conference and lost 4-0 in the quarterfinals of the NEWMAC Championship to Coast Guard Academy. The Cougars recorded wins against Bridgewater State College (6-1), Worcester State College (7-0), cross-town conference rival WPI (5-2) and Rhode Island College (7-0).

Sophomore Oliver Hartman led the Cougars with a 7-2 overall record at the number two singles position. He received NEWMAC Player of the Week



honors during the season. At the second doubles position he was 5-4. First-year Nikola Milinkovic had a solid rookie season. He finished with an 8-2 overall record and 4-

2 NEWMAC record, playing most of his matches at the number five singles position. He compiled a 3-0 record at the number two doubles position with Hartman. "This was a cold, wet and windy season, making practices challenging if at all possible and forcing the team to play a number of matches over the course of three weeks," commented Zeutas-Broer. "Despite these obstacles this young team competed hard and demonstrated a lot of heart and spirit. The experience gained should help them to be contenders in the conference in coming seasons. It was a most enjoyable experience coaching this team of fine young men."

Men's Lacrosse

The men's lacrosse team finished this season under first-year head coach Evan Davis with a 1-7 overall record, 0-4 NEWMAC record and 1-5 Pilgrim League record. The Cougars ended the season with an exciting 12-8 home win over Maine Maritime Academy. Senior attackman and co-captain Kyle Devitte led the Cougars with three goals and four assists while first-year goalkeeper Joe Snevely made 17 saves to record his first collegiate win.

Leading the way for the Cougars in 2003 was Devitte who finished the season with a team-high 11 goals and added five assists for a total of 16 points. He recorded 15 ground balls. Junior attackman Ryan Race was second on the team with seven goals.

First-year attackman Scott Foglietta had an impressive rookie season with five goals, six assists, 11 points and eight ground balls. Leading the way on the



defensive end was Snevely, who played the entire season in net. Fighting off tremendous offensive pressure this year he made an impressive 174 saves in eight games.

"This was a building year for the men's lacrosse team. Though numbers were low, the team worked extremely hard and never gave up in any situation," explained Davis. "They showed that they could work as a unit both on and off the field. We are looking forward to a successful 2004 season, with our new recruits, and a Spring Break training trip down south."

Men's & Women's Crew

Despite the long winter and an icy lake the men's crew team competed this spring under first-year head coach Sam Stratton '01. Once the ice melted the Cougars finished fourth out of eight boats in a varsity four race against Franklin Pierce, Assumption, Fairfield and Bowdoin. The varsity four boat posted a first-place finish against WPI and Connecticut College in a subsequent race. Highlighting the season was the varsity four boat's showing at the New England Championship. Clark's boat finished second in its heat and advanced to the finals where the Cougars finished sixth overall.



Members of the varsity four included

sophomore coxswain Michael Agnelli and sophomore rowers Brian Godard, Anthony Fanelli, John Matulis and Sam Licciardo. The women's crew team finished sixth in the NEWMAC Championship under the direction of third-year head coach Jim Looney '97. Sophomore Ashley Blake '05 and senior Judith Hogan '03 earned NEWMAC Varsity All-Conference honors while sophomore Hana Johnson was named to the NEWMAC Novice All-Conference team. ★

Athletic Department Involved in Community Service

Clark student-athletes were involved in a number of community service activities throughout the year. Below are some of the projects they participated in:

Student-athletes participated in three reading days at neighborhood elementary schools...A total of 26 athletes representing nine varsity teams volunteered to read to students at the Belmont Community School, the Accelerated Learning Laboratory and the Jacob Hiatt School this fall.

The SAAC Community Service Committee organized a clothing and toiletry drive for People in Peril, a Worcester homeless shelter. On Dec. 7, fans donated items or money in lieu of buying a ticket to the men's and women's basketball games. The committee raised \$265, in addition to bags of donated goods. The committee also helped organize a number of athletes that volunteered for the Special Olympics in March, which was held on the university's campus.

The men's basketball team has continued their involvement with a weekly reading program at the Goddard

School...Coach Paul Phillips and four of his players read to third graders for one hour every Thursday morning...In addition, Coach Phillips and some of his players conducted a B1-B2 (Books First, Basketball Second) Clinic at the All School this past fall.

Members of the women's soccer team and Coach Brady attended the Chandler Magnet School during December to read to kindergarten students and assist them in making gingerbread houses. In addition, players conducted a soccer clinic for a Charlton youth team, ran a soccer clinic at the Y for NAGWS Day in February and participated in the Girls Scout Sports Day helping the young girls earn required badges in soccer.

The volleyball team volunteered at Girl's Inc. for the third straight year. Two to three players spent two hours each Saturday from January through April at Girl's Inc. teaching volleyball to participants. In addition, three representatives of the team ran a volleyball clinic at the Y for NAGWS Day in February. ★

Bellcourt Named Head Tennis Coach

Clark University Athletic Director Linda Moulton recently announced the appointment of Gregory Bellcourt as head men's and women's tennis coach. He is currently the Head Tennis Professional at the Sudbury River Tennis Club in Framingham, MA.

Bellcourt's coaching experience includes a seven-year stint as head coach of the boys and girls teams at Tyngsboro High School (1994-2001). He also coached at Queensbury High School from 1987-1992 and served as an assistant coach at the College of St. Rose for one year (1993-1994). While at Queensbury, Bellcourt coached a number of girls to state level success at the individual NY State Tournament in 1992. His teams achieved high regional rankings as a result of winning sectional championships in 1989 and 1991 (girls) and 1990 and 1992 (boys).

As a tournament player, he secured the #4 and #9 rankings in Men's Open Tournaments during the mid '90s and recently was ranked #36 in the National 35's for the year 2002. ★

Coach Linda Wage Inducted into Providence College Hall of Fame

Head field hockey and softball coach Linda Wage was inducted into the Providence College Hall of Fame in February. Wage, who earned a bachelor's degree at Providence College in 1981, was a four-year field hockey player and is PC's all-time leading scorer with New England records of 95 career goals and 213 career points. A New England College All-Star, she played at the National Hockey Festival in 1979 and 1980. Wage also was a four-year member of the Providence basketball team that won the AIAW Regional crown. In addition, she captained the softball team and was a Rhode Island State Tournament All-Star four times for her play at short-

stop. In 1980, Wage was honored as PC's Female Athlete of the Year.

In her 18 seasons as Clark's field hockey coach, Wage has earned a career record of 198-119-23, including a record-breaking 19-4 season in 2002. She has directed the Cougars to 12 postseason appearances in the last 16 years. In the last eight years as Clark's softball coach, Wage has earned an impressive 186-77 record with seven postseason appearances. In 1999, she earned NEWMAC Coach of the Year honors and led the Cougars to their first NCAA Division III Tournament. She recently completed her 15th year as head softball coach at Clark. ★

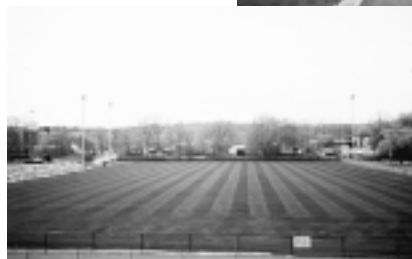
"Significantly improving our outdoor space and increasing our indoor space will greatly enhance Clark's athletic and recreational programs," says Athletic Director Linda Moulton. "Current and future student-athletes will positively benefit from our new facilities and the opportunities that will be provided. There is tremendous excitement about what these new facilities will do for the campus and the extended Clark community."

The new field house will relieve the overlapping demands on the Kneller Athletic Center. The building will serve as the support facility for fall and spring teams, complementing the new outdoor spaces. Space will also be available for some intramural activities, club sports and other recreational and neighborhood programs.

While providing much needed space for Clark's athletic teams, the field house also offered the opportunity to honor two of Clark's most avid supporters: Joan and Tom Dolan.

The Dolans have a long personal history with Clark. They were married as undergraduates, and both of their children earned degrees at Clark. Tom Jr. graduated in 1979, and Brian earned an M.B.A. in 1987. Tom Jr. also met his wife, Cheryl '81, at Clark. In addition, Tom has spent his entire professional career at Clark, encouraging countless alumni and friends to get involved with and lend their support to the University, with Joan acting as his co-ambassador for the University.

Tom joined the Clark staff in 1963 as a financial-aid officer, and later worked in admissions, alumni affairs and development. He served for eight years as vice president for Alumni Affairs and Planned Giving, and was then named to his current position, senior vice president, in 1993. To put his tenure at Clark in perspective, Tom has worked for six of the University's eight presidents.



Many of the positive developments that have taken place at Clark over the years are a direct result of Tom's work "friend raising" for the University. The heart of his work philosophy is

the "raise friends first, then funds." According to Tom, Joan made important contributions to these efforts.

"A number of major gifts have been made to Clark not because of me, but because of Joan," Tom says. Over the course of their 46-year marriage, he explains, Joan has welcomed countless alumni, students and friends of Clark into their home in West Boylston and the Dolan cottage on Cape Cod, helping Tom and Clark build and strengthen important relationships. ★

Dedication of Dolan Field House and Completion of the Granger Field Project

The newly built Thomas M. '62 and Joan E. '60 Dolan Field House was dedicated on Saturday morning of Reunion weekend. Alumni and friends took the first look at the new field house and athletic-field complex, which opened officially during Reunion weekend. The Dolan Field House is named for Clark's Senior Vice President Tom Dolan and his wife Joan, in honor of their many years of service to the University. A second hub of athletic activity on campus, the project includes the \$5-million field house which will house practice facilities, both varsity, visitor and coaches/officials locker rooms, a training room, public bathrooms, a concession stand, and an out-



door plaza on the second level. This project also involved a \$2.8-million reconstruction and relocation of the tennis courts, a PlexiPave surface and a new natural grass soccer/lacrosse field and new synthetic turf baseball/field hockey field. The upgrade of the fields

has provided Clark with first-class lighted competitive venues for the varsity programs while providing multi-purpose spaces for a variety of other programs and activities.
