Other pedagogical activities

International System (IS) simulation (Fall 2018). Four weeks/26 students. Students engaged in month-long negotiation simulation employing both in-class and online negotiation contexts. The setting of the simulation is an ad-hoc Global Policy Summit (GPS) comprised of eight (8) of the most prominent states in the international system, convened to develop a set of detailed policy responses to three issue areas: 1) environmental and natural resource sustainability; 2) humanitarian emergencies; and 3) arms control and nonproliferation. Students worked individually and in small groups over four weeks and convened formally in four distinct negotiation summits of 1.5 hours each.

PIPA (Paradigms in Practice and Application): Global Migration Crisis simulation (Spring 2018)

Three weeks/24 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the PSCI 207 course. Within the structure of a crisis summit, students participated as designated representatives of nine major IR theories, engaging in research and in-class and extracurricular simulated negotiations to identify and produce an agenda outlining the most relevant facets of the ongoing global migration crisis and appropriate/representative policy responses.

EURO-REF 2017 – European Refugee Crisis simulation (Spring 2017)

Three weeks/28 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the Politics of the European Union course (PSCI 243). Within the structure of an EU IGC, students engage in research and in-class and extracurricular simulated negotiations to identify and produce an agenda outlining the most relevant facets of the ongoing European migration crisis and appropriate/representative policy responses from the standpoint of 28 member-states of the EU.

The Syrian Civil War and the Spread of Terror Simulation (PSCI 299, Fall 2016/Spring 2017). Three months/9 students. During the period December 2016-February 2017 a group of graduate and undergraduate students represented the United States in a multinational simulation focused on the Syrian civil war, designed and coordinated by Bar-Ilan University (Israel). The Clark delegation simulated the NSC in identifying and crafting an appropriate policy response, with the simulation involving a mix of in-person and online negotiations.

PIPA (Paradigms in Practice and Application): European Migration crisis simulation (Spring 2016)

Three weeks/26 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the PSCI 207 course. Within the structure of a crisis summit, students participated as designated representatives of eight major IR theories, engaging in research and in-class and extracurricular simulated negotiations to identify and produce an agenda outlining the most relevant facets of the ongoing European migration crisis and appropriate/representative policy responses.

PIPA (Paradigms in Practice and Application): Crimea-Ukraine crisis simulation (Spr 2014)

Three weeks/31 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the PSCI 207 course. Within the structure of a crisis summit, students participated as designated representatives of nine major IR theories, engaging in research and in-class and extracurricular simulated negotiations to identify and produce an agenda outlining the most relevant facets of the ongoing crisis in Crimea/eastern Ukraine and appropriate/representative policy responses.

'IGC: Revisiting Europe 2020' simulation (Spring 2012)

Three weeks/28 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the PSCI 243 course. Within the structure of an EU Intergovernmental Conference (IGC), students participated as designated representatives of the member-states of the European Union; engaged in research and simulated negotiations to identify and produce an agenda outlining the most relevant policy issues and appropriate responses for the EU for the next decade.

'The Four Party Talks on Extraordinary Rendition' (Fall 2011)

One session (three hours) / 15 students. Developed original simulation exercise for use in first year seminar ('Just and Unjust Wars', PSCI 096) exploring political, legal, and ethical implications of extraordinary rendition through the prism of the case of Abu Omar. Students designated as representatives of major

concerned parties (U.S., Egypt, Italy, European Union) and tasked with reaching a negotiated settlement concerning aforementioned case.

'Egypt and U.S. Foreign Policy' simulation (Spring 2011)

One week / 24 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the PSCI 238 course in conjunction with contemporaneous events in Egypt. Students assigned to various roles in executive and legislative branch; engaged in research and collaboration to develop an appropriate U.S. policy response to the political turmoil and transition in Egypt.

'IGC: Europe 2020' simulation (Fall 2010)

Three weeks/26 students. Developed original simulation exercise/curriculum for use within the PSCI 243 course. Within the structure of an EU Intergovernmental Conference (IGC), students participated as designated representatives of the member-states of the European Union; engaged in research and simulated negotiations to identify and produce an agenda outlining the most relevant policy issues and appropriate responses for the EU for the next decade.

'Agenda for the New Multilateralism' simulation (PSCI 169, Spring 2010). Original simulation exercise/curriculum developed around structure of a multilateral summit to craft an international policy agenda for the next decade.

Georgian Membership Crisis simulation – (GOVT 243, Fall 2008). Original simulation developed in response to fictionalized EU Candidate Member petition by the Republic of Georgia.
